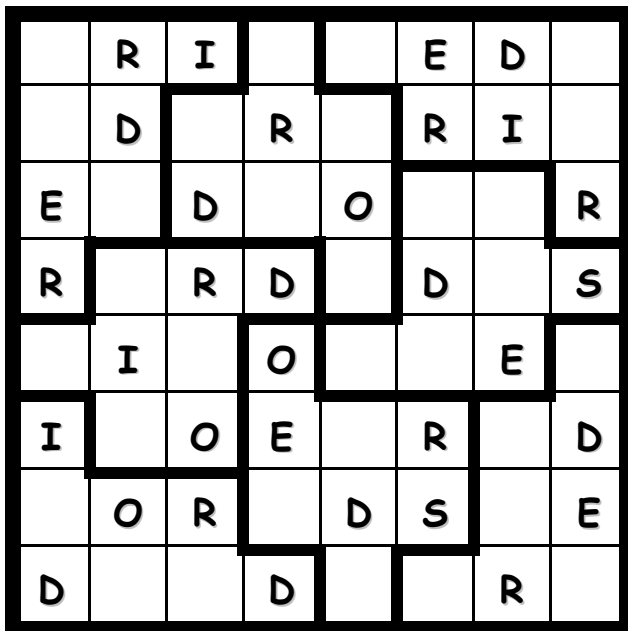
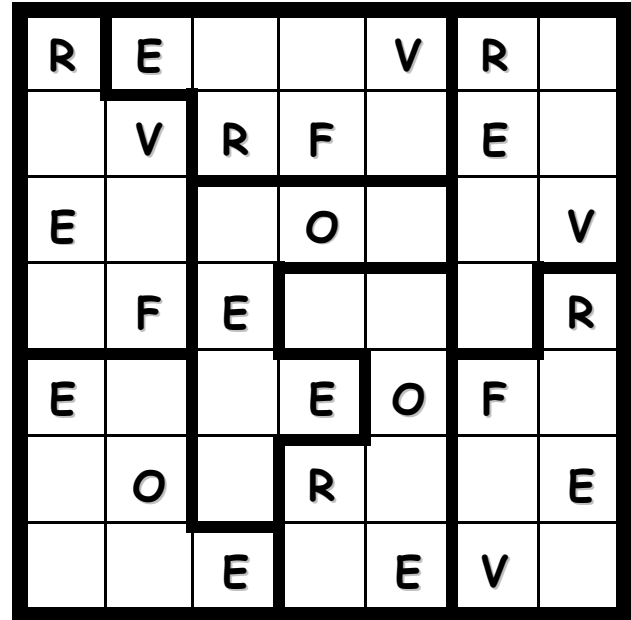


Tuck Everlasting by Natalie Babbitt
