Inference Activity: Word Connotation II

Step One: Consider the word *walk*.

Step Two: Think of 5-10 synonyms for it.

Examples: mosey, meander, tromp, traipse, glide, plod, slog, stomp, march, trek, roam, stride, tramp, trudge, hike, ramble, sashay, prowl, tread

Step Three: Read the following sentences and make an *inference* about each of the subjects. What *general ideas* can you arrive at (emotions or traits)? Pay careful attention to the verb in each sentence; it will help you make an accurate inference.

Example:

Alexander moseyed down his street one morning.

<u>Inference</u>: Because he was moseying, he was not in a hurry. Alexander is probably relaxed as he walks.
