O ne crop, the peanut, had more than 100 uses

N ever taking a vacation he spent many hours as a researcher

C arver never married.

A gricultural research was his whole life.

R esearch on pecans revealed 75 different products.

V ersatile uses for the sweet potato were also found.

E xpended energy in improving relations between blacks and whites

R emembered for his work and for his life savings left to the Tuskegee Institute.
